Why Ukraine?

Ukraine is a newly independent nation and the largest country in Europe. Bordering the Black Sea, it lies between Poland and Russia. Its capitol is Kyiv. The nation was absorbed into the Russian Empire in the late 18th century and into the Soviet Union in 1920. Brutal Soviet rule engineered two artificial famines in which over 10 million died. In World War II, German and Soviet armies were responsible for some 7 million more deaths. Thousands of Ukrainians still suffer from the devastating effects of the nuclear accident at the Chernobyl Nuclear Plant in 1986.

The Ukrainian republic achieved independence in 1991 after the dissolution of the USSR, but democracy is in its infancy as the nation struggles to achieve economic reform, privatization, and the protection of civil liberties.

Most recently, Ukrainians rejected the government corruption left over from Soviet times and changed the course of their history. By massive peaceful demonstrations, they demanded free and fair elections.

Cincinnati's Link to Ukraine

In 1989, before Ukraine became an independent nation, Cincinnati established a Sister City relationship with the city of Kharkiv in Ukraine. The nation's new independence gave the Cincinnati-Kharkiv Sister City Program (CKSCP) the opportunity to help the people of Kharkiv discover the benefits and responsibilities of a free society. Over the past 15 years the people of the two cities have worked in cooperative projects in over 70 areas of mutual interest in the fields of business, culture, medicine, education, social issues, religious freedoms, and human rights. Over 2,500 Cincinnatians and Kharkivites have traveled between the two cities under the auspices of CKSCP to share, teach, learn, and understand. Cincinnati-Kharkiv is known as one of the strongest sister city pairings in the world.

The many successes of CKSCP's programs have also attracted the attention and interest of other communities in Ukraine, and recent programs have included individuals from other parts of Ukraine. It is time to grow.

The Cincinnati-Ukraine Partnership (CUP) continues and expands the success of CKSCP to reach all of Ukraine. Now our expanded focus will need the help of more Greater Cincinnati businesses and individuals to continue the work we are doing, and the work we hope to do.
